

Navigator Update Spring 2012

Providing a Point of Entry for ABI Services Across Southeastern Ontario

I Asked How the System is Working, and You Told Me:

- Need to make quicker transitions from acute care to rehab for patients
- Those with undiagnosed ABI's need help but are not eligible for service without a diagnosis
- Need opportunities to increase ABI competency amongst community therapists and professionals
- Better service coordination is required to ensure those with ABI and Mental Health needs are provided with adequate service
- A lack of community housing options means more young survivors are ending up living in long term care
- Family doctors need to be engaged in brain injury issues
- ABI patients are forced to remain in acute care hospital beds long term because rehabilitation or support options do not exist in their own communities

The Journey So Far...

Hello! I would like to introduce myself to you as the Acquired Brain Injury (ABI) System Navigator for Southeastern Ontario. The goal of this newsletter is to keep you informed of my work and the developments we are working towards. Having come to this position after working directly with people living with brain injuries for the last five years, I had what I believed to be a good grasp of the issues in ABI. As I have begun the work of a System Navigator I am learning there are many perspectives out there, so many more than I could have imagined.

The first goal of System Navigation has been to establish our presence as a point of entry for brain injury services within Southeastern Ontario. Steps have been made in this direction, including many visits to service providers to explain the role, and the launch of braininjuryhelp.ca, a website designed to assist professionals and consumers alike in accessing education and services. We are working towards a standardized referral process and we are getting closer to implementing a region-wide database to track statistics regarding LHIN-funded service provision, as including waitlists for services. Step by step, we are creating a clearer pathway for service provision in Southeastern Ontario.

The role of System Navigator has had me travelling across the region to meet hospital staff, community organizations, and medical centres, as well as joining committees and groups that share a common goal. I came with the intention of simply introducing this new initiative, but have listened and learned so much from those I have met. These conversations have ranged from ideas about what System Navigation might accomplish one day, to hearing concern and frustration for those whose needs are not being adequately met. Although we may not be able to change the system overnight, I am confident that our efforts will bring about changes slowly and carefully—in a way which is well thought out and sustainable. There are so many of us out there who care, and together we can make a difference
